

Meet Sherry Lopez-DeWolf

No challenge appears too large for Sherry, who joined SLOCOE's Payroll staff approximately two months ago. She says she loves to learn, peeling layers of knowledge like the layers of an onion as she deepens her understanding of school Prior to joining SLOCOE Sherry devoted her time and attention to overseeing distance learning in her own home for three nieces and a nephew, now ages 11, 14, 16 and 17. "We call our house, Homework Club, Est. 2018," she says proudly, adding that her husband is her biggest supporter and cheerleader.

Sherry's home is on property purchased by her grandfather in the 1930s, steeped in generations



of family history. Her father grew up there with 13 siblings. During her ten-year stint as a real estate transaction coordinator, Sherry learned how to split the property into two lots and built a new home on the other lot. It took courage to demolish the structurally unsound house that had stood there for years, but Sherry was undaunted. "I drove the bulldozer knocking down the porch!" she says.

sustainable and long-term employment. She feels like she belongs here.

In her life away from work, Sherry enjoys horses. Learning to ride five years ago transformed her life, helping her to heal from the trauma of a sudden health crisis that befell a family member while they were vacationing in Hawaii. She now rides as often as possible, at Oceano Beach, at Montana de Oro, and other locations throughout the county. Another companion in her life is Amigo, a chihuaha-mix pup, adopted from Woods Humane Society.

Shannon Pimentel, SLOCOE's coordinator for Raising a Reader, explains that a collaboration with The Monday Club helps to collect donations of new and gently used children's books. The Monday Club delivers the books to the SLO Food Bank, which then offers the books to children and families along with meals. Labels in the books provide reading tips for parents to support regular reading routines and family bonding. According to Shannon, 2,000 books were collected on the first day.

What are you most proud of during your career here? The people I have had the privilege of serving with.


