Experience with the Boys and Girls Club, and then the YMCA motivated her to earn an associates degree in child development, which in turn led to a BA in child development.

Daniela says she saw the impact she could make in the lives of students with behavior issues that needed time and attention. It is gratifying to her when individuals encounter her later and share their successes. Five years with Lucia Mar Unified School District in their Homeless & Foster Youth Services program - as well as more than a year with CAPSLO as a family resource center supervisor - deepened Daniela's connections to families in our county and



the network of collaborative agencies that provide provide services to them.

SLOCOE offers Daniela what she calls "a perfect opportunity for growth." She adds, "I feel like everyone here reached out to help and make me feel right at home, which is huge." She loves that each day is different from the day before. "I don't come to work knowing what my day will be like," she says.

Born and raised in Nipomo to parents who are first generation transplants from Mexico, Daniela enjoys the proximity of family that includes siblings, a nephew, and

Meet Chris Balogh

Director, Alternative Education, Student Programs & Services

High school students - even those who seemingly perform at upper levels of achievement in athletics and subject knowledge - do not fit into easy molds. No one knows this better than Chris Balogh, who joins SLOCOE at a new stage in his teaching and administrative career, a career that has spanned 25 years in three counties, 22 of them in San Luis Obispo County.

"I learned the value of teaching the whole student, not just the subject," says Chris of his early teaching experiences in Humboldt and



Butte counties, where the timber industry once reigned. While his specialty is English, he stretched himself to teach other subjects as well, including Social Studies and Algebra, and coached many athletic teams. These experiences helped him to realize the importance of knowing students in more than one aspect of their high school lives. Some of his students had no aspirations for the future beyond following previous generations into the lumber mills. Chris found ways to widen their scopes. A film and literature class developed their creative writing abilities. A service learning project for student docents or guides in a nearby 30,000-acre preserve provided opportunities for connection to the natural world.

Chris later relocated to San Luis Obispo County with his wife Carolyn, where they settled in to raise a daughter and son. Carolyn now teaches at the Fine Arts Academy and ACE (Atascadero Choices in Education) Academy in Atascadero. Carolyn's watercolors illustrate a children's storybook co-published with author Lori Thomas-Hicks. Chris has served as dean at San Luis High School, and principal at San Gabriel Elementary, Paloma Creek High School, and ACE Academy. He has taught grades 7-12 in English, Math and Social Studies. He loves the classroom, but also loves the wider perspective of an administrator. It feels right to work with students who are disenfranchised, he says, finding out what works for each individual in order to best meet their educational needs.

Chris and his wife enjoy cooking classes together, and the family recently traveled together to Costa Rica. Welcome, Chris! We wish you a great new school year.
