For Stacy Summers, "work is a happy place," and SLOCOE is "amazing!" year veteran of the Paso Robles Joint Unified School District, Stacy came to SLOCOE with Spanish language skills, a heart for English learners, and appreciation of the collaborative, problem-solving spirit she finds among her colleagues here. She works closely with Joe Koski and Melanie Crawford, assisting local school districts with the technical aspects of their LCAPs (Local Control Accountability Plans), and their state and federal compliance efforts.



Stacy's personal story of her discovery of a passion early in life are a testament to the role of schools and family in helping to awaken young people to possible careers. Her motivation to become an educator

began in childhood and was inspired in part by her sister's disabilities and experiences in school, but also by attendance at a camp for aspiring teachers. "I always wanted to be a teacher," she says.

A second element of Stacy's career path came into play when a class in middle school kindled an interest in Spanish. The influences of an aunt who was bilingual, and another who immigrated to the US from Mexico reinforced that interest. After graduating from high school, Stacy participated in a summer language immersion program sponsored by the University of Guadalajara. She lived with a family in Mexico for six weeks at the age of 17, traveling and exploring Mexico on weekends with two fellow students. Her courage at such a young age during an era when mobile phones were not available is remarkable, but the rewards were worthwhile. Stacy fell in love with the language and the culture. Years later, she was a first grade teacher at Georgia Brown Elementary School helping to put in place its dual immersion language program, the first of its kind in our county.

Stacy is a devoted wife and mother, a camping, hiking and dirt-bike-riding enthusiast, and a self-confessed jokester. "Elf-on-the-Shelf" pranks and jokes feature prominently in her family's holiday traditions, and her son has taken up the calling, recreating past photo images for his grandmother as a continuation of the family fun. Stacy, thank you for bringing your spirit of fun and passion for education to SLOCOE!

ALICE and "Stop the Bleed" Events Taught Life-Saving Response Skills.















Photos at Top: As part of a special safety meeting at SLOCOE's main office last November, an instructor from Sierra Vista Regional Medical Center demonstrated how to control bleeding when someone is injured. Staff learned that uncontrolled bleeding is the number one cause of preventable death. Staff also learned that members of the public are immediate responders who can prevent death from trauma in the event of a natural or man-made incident. Photos, Middle and Bottom Row: ALICE Active Shooter Response Training, held December 1-2 for county school district and law enforcement staff helped participants learn and practice skills in responding to incidents such as violent intruders, mass shooting, terrorism or workplace violence. Nearly 30 people attended the event, funded by the California Office of Emergency Services. ALICE (translated to Alert Lockdown Inform Counter Evacuate) is an easy method for remembering life-saving steps.
