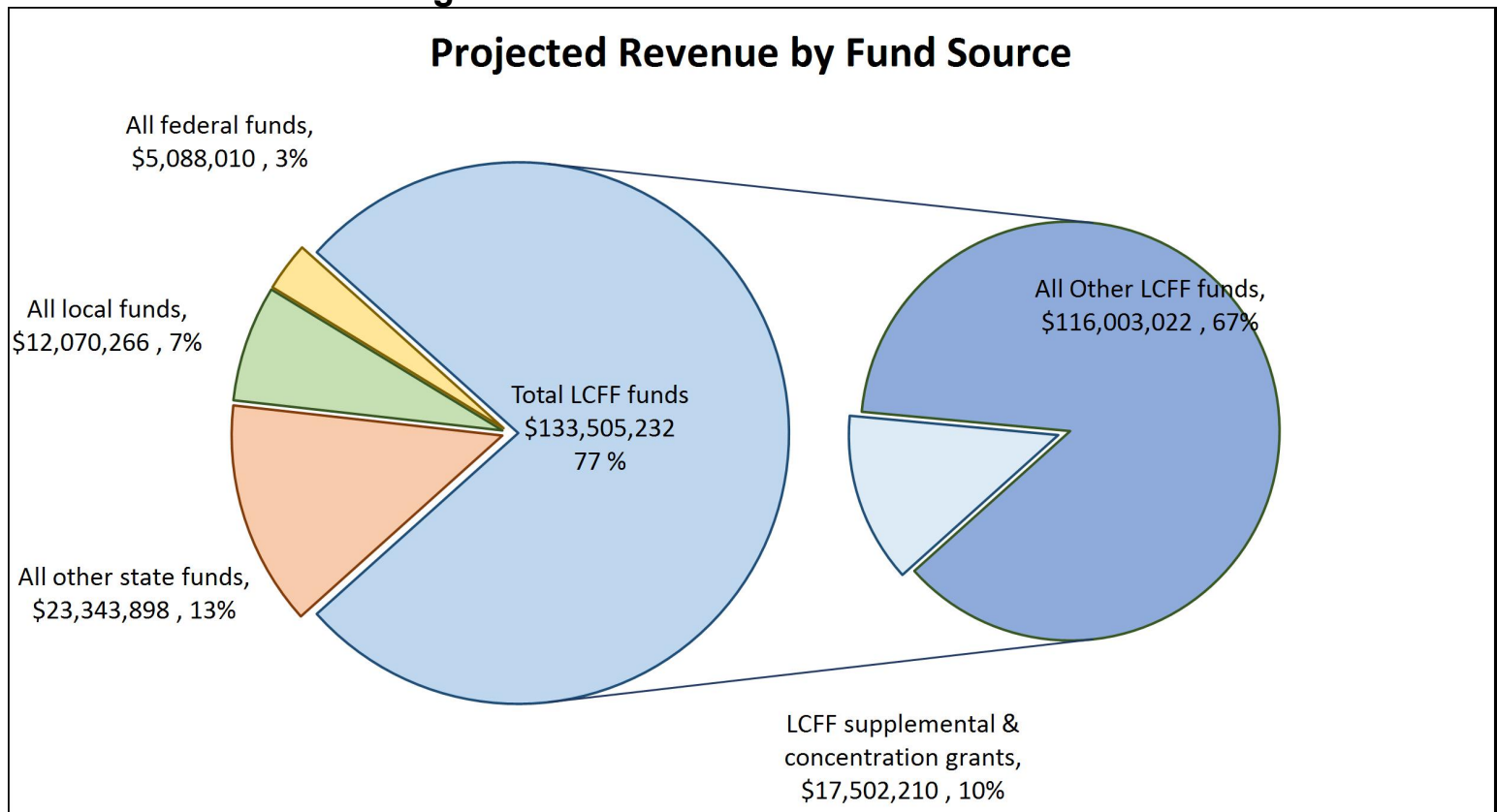

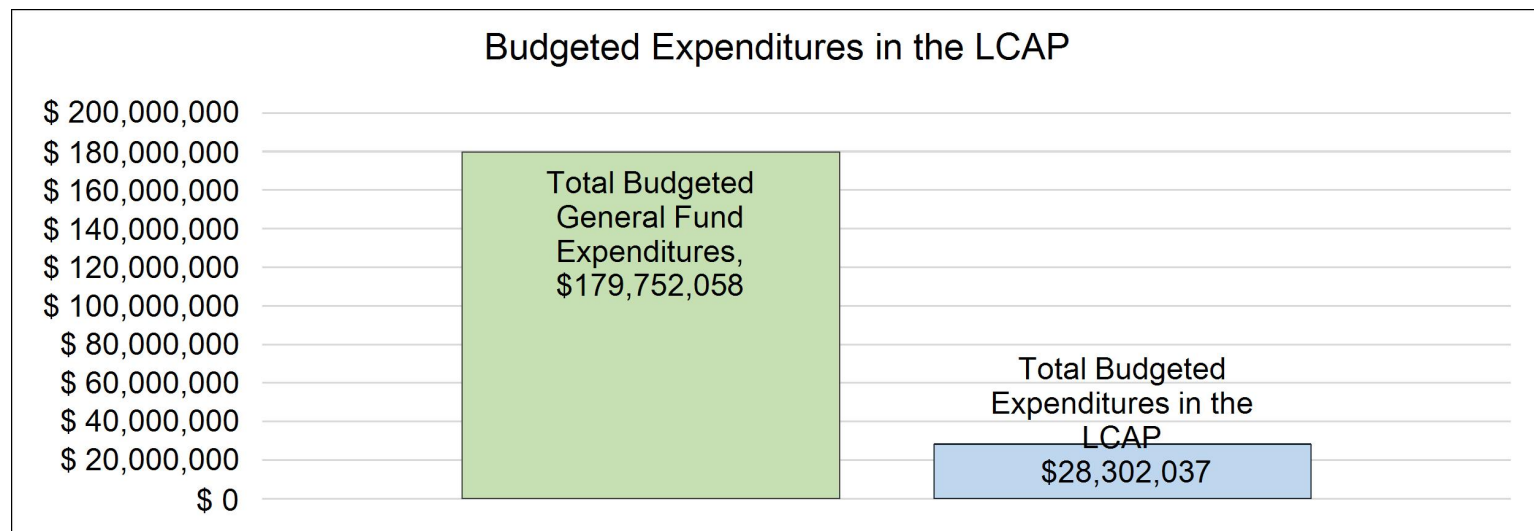


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Lucia Mar Unified School District expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

The text description for the above chart is as follows: The total revenue projected for Lucia Mar Unified School District is \$174,007,406, of which \$133,505,232 is Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF), \$23,343,898 is other state funds, \$12,070,266 is local funds, and \$5,088,010 is federal funds. Of the \$133,505,232 in LCFF Funds, \$17,502,210 is generated based on the enrollment of high needs students (Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students).

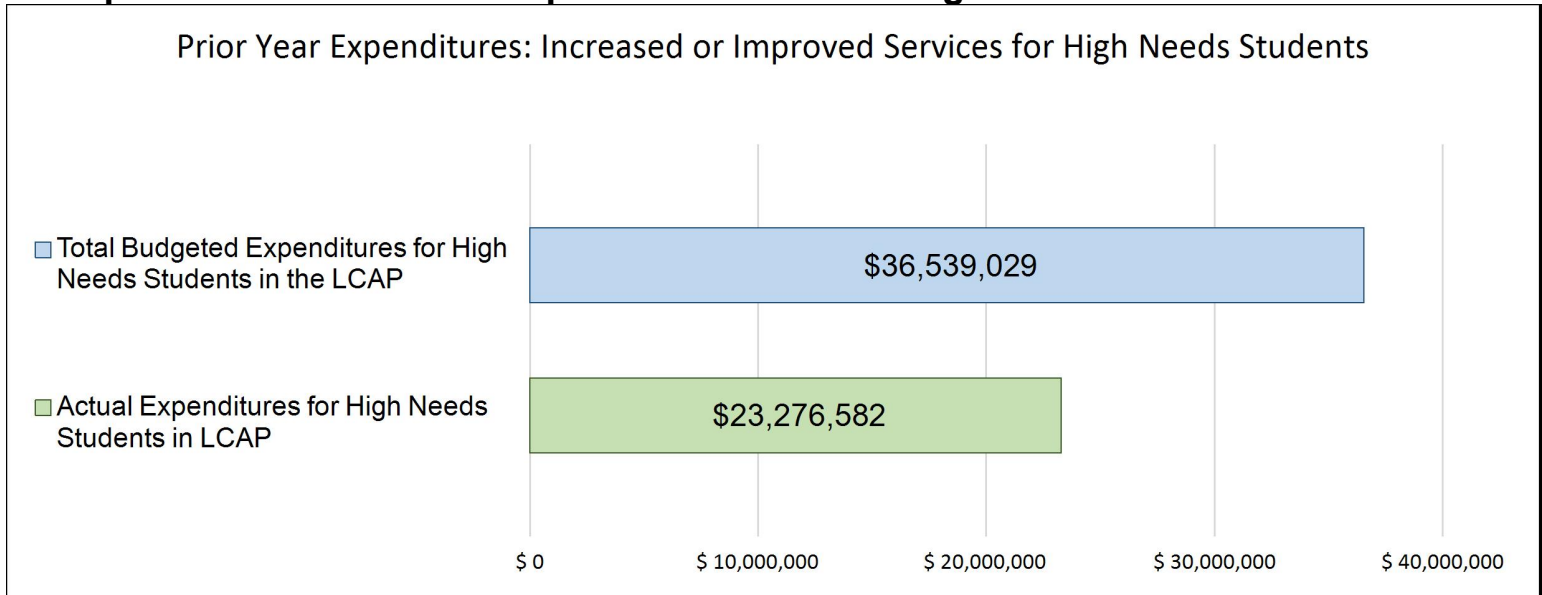
General fund budget expenditures that are not included in the LCAP primarily include staff salaries, materials and supplies, and other routine needs to run the district.

In 2026-27, Lucia Mar Unified School District is projecting it will receive \$17,502,210 based on the enrollment of Foster Youth, English learner, and low-income students. The difference between the budgeted and actual expenditures of \$13,262,447 had the following impact on Lucia Mar Unified School District's ability to increase or improve services for high needs students:

Lucia Mar Unified School District had a few positions that were filled by less expensive individuals, and we were also able to move the cost of our transitional kindergarten instructional assistants into the general fund and out of the LCAP. Services were provided to students as planned.

Plan Summary [2026-27]

General Information

Lucia Mar Unified School District (LMUSD) is home to 19 schools, an adult education program, and a preschool program for students with disabilities. Situated on the beautiful Central Coast, LMUSD is the largest school district in San Luis Obispo County, with 9,577 students enrolled as of this writing.

As we look at LMUSD now, compared to years past, one of the most significant changes we face is declining enrollment, although the decline has eased in recent years. We have been on a downward trajectory for a number of years, and, although we've seen a welcome increase this year compared to our projections, we are constantly looking for ways to bring us back to approximately 10,000 students again.

Over the past several years we've enjoyed a number of highlights in the district. From opening our newest school, Pacific View Academy, to expanding the reach of transitional kindergarten as the universal prekindergarten (UPK) initiative continues, we are eager to continue to see improvements across all areas. We're particularly pleased with ongoing facilities work due to two community-supported general obligation bonds (known as Measure I and Measure H), which has allowed the district to build many new classrooms and create new learning spaces across the district. We have notable improvements at all sites, which has been a welcome and rejuvenating process for our school community.

Additionally, Lopez High School was identified as an Equity Multiplier school for the upcoming school year. The Equity Multiplier goal remains the same for the 26-27 school year.

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

As we reflect on the 2025 CA School Dashboard, overall we were pleased to see improvement from the 2024 Dashboard. General results include the following.

English Language Arts: Lucia Mar was in the Green area, and we increased by 10.3 points overall. This is an improvement from last year, when the district was in the Yellow area.

Mathematics: Lucia Mar was in the Yellow area, and we increased by 6.1 points overall. This is good news, we're moving in the right direction.

English Learner Progress: Lucia Mar was in the Orange area, and we maintained with 1.4% improvement. This is an area of concern for us, and we have clarified actions for ELs in the goals that follow.

Chronic Absenteeism: Lucia Mar was in the Orange area, and we improved by 0.1%. However, because the improvement was not significant, we moved from yellow to orange in this area. We have specific actions addressing chronic absenteeism in the LCAP.

Suspension: Lucia Mar was in the Green area, and we improved by 0.6%. We are pleased that extensive work in PBIS at many of our sites has brought us back to Green this year, as we hoped.

Graduation Rate: Lucia Mar was in the Green area, and we improved our already high graduation rate by 2.2%. This is an improvement from the 24 Dashboard, as we planned.

College and Career Indicator: Lucia Mar is at the Green level, with 61.3% of our students prepared. This is a significant increase from 2024, with an additional 7% of graduates prepared.

It is also important to reflect on the areas where our district has received the lowest performance level on the 2023 Dashboard. LCAP rules require districts to keep these red areas in the LCAP for a full three year cycle. Those areas, and the actions identified to improve them, are listed below.

In addition to the actions indicated above in the various goals in the LCAP, each site that has a subgroup in the lowest performance level has an additional specific plan indicated in their School Plan for Student Achievement (SPSA). Lucia Mar still has some unspent Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant (LREBG) funds budgeted for the next two years. Action 1.26 in Goal 1 will be funded with LREBG funds. We have worked with our educational partners to identify high yield, allowable actions, and, consequently, we will be funding instructional aides at our elementary schools over the next two years. More detail is provided in Action 1.26.

A description of how the adopted LCAP was influenced by the feedback provided by educational partners.

Our educational partner engagement process resulted in some important considerations for the development of the LCAP plan. Specifically, the following elements were considered:

- Our parent survey indicated top their top priorities were additional academic intervention opportunities. Using a combination of both LCAP and Student Support Professional Development Discretionary Block Grant (SSPDDBG) funds, we're pleased to continue funding additional intervention teachers at the elementary level to meet this need. We're also maintaining increased support for before and after school tutoring. Although the funding amount remains the same in supplemental and concentration grant funding, we are adding funding in other sources, including ELOP and Title I. The other top concern was counseling and therapist intern support. This strong priority, which was also the strongest priority on the staff survey and the student survey, helps to reaffirm our commitment to our increased counselor support, which we added to the LCAP 3 years ago.
- Our staff survey informed the support for counseling, as described above. Staff also expressed strong support for intervention opportunities. We have been intentionally saving supplemental grant dollars to fund our larger intervention program. We increased intervention sections and teachers using one-time state and federal dollars, and returned them to the LCAP in 25-26. Using a combination of both LCAP and Student Support Professional Development Discretionary Block Grant (SSPDDBG) funds, we're pleased to continue funding additional intervention teachers at the elementary level to meet this need. Staff members on the LCAP committee also asked for consideration for a number of things that are negotiable, including increased stipends for bilingual staff and AVID staff. These conversations will be wrapped into our next negotiations cycle when it begins. Additionally, staff echoed the need to support our students with mental health and counseling services. Although we have not yet increased access to LMFTs or

social workers, this is on the radar for future years, as funding permits. Finally, based on strong advocacy from our labor partners, we are adding an additional special education program specialist, bringing our total number to three (Action 1.17).

- Our student survey also prioritized high support for counseling and tutoring options, in concert with families and staff. We continue to prioritize counseling support in the LCAP, and have maintained and plan to increase additional funding for tutoring at all sites.
- Our educational partner feedback from Lopez High School, our Equity Multiplier site, provided clear support for additional counseling and therapist time. To that end, we will use equity multiplier funds to contract for additional days of counseling, which will supplement the guidance counselor who is already assigned to the site. Additionally, the Lopez team has partnered with Yondr, the cell phone pouch company, for a number of years. While very expensive, the students, parents, and staff, have found Yondr to be a great way to limit access to cell phones during instructional time. This no cell phone policy has created better behavior and more focused learning environments. Equity Multiplier funding will be used to expand the reach of the Yondr service into the years to come, so the school can continue this innovative and effective practice. In summary, the equity multiplier funds will be used to continue to create the conditions for learning that students need in order to thrive at our continuation high school.
- Finally, our SELPA consultation reaffirmed our commitment to the additional school psychologists and the program specialists that are funded through the LCAP. Our students with disabilities are an important group to focus on, and we have plans in place to continue improvement in this area, including additional professional learning at all levels to make sure that our students are included and provided a rigorous and standards-aligned curriculum, no matter the course they are enrolled in.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

The actions under Goal 1 were broadly implemented as planned. Key investments included hiring additional K–6 teachers (Action 1.1) and providing intervention services at secondary and elementary levels (Actions 1.2, 1.5, 1.20, 1.25). Technology-based interventions were also expanded, such as through software (Action 1.4), student hotspots (Action 1.19), and device refreshes (Action 1.15). Professional development and instructional coaching (Actions 1.7, 1.13, 1.21) ensured that educators were supported in implementing standards and addressing achievement gaps, especially for unduplicated students. One notable change is in Action 1.11. Although we did hire all the TK IAs as indicated, we were able to move the costs of those salaries to the general fund, once the state began to provide ADA funding for TK students. With that savings, we were able to complete a one time project to install mounted iPads in each secondary classroom and many

school offices to track student participation (see Action 2.17, next goal). Additionally, we were able to offer some one-time mini grants to school sites to complete additional intervention-related projects (captured in increased funding in Action 1.8). Finally, our spending for our Learning Recovery Emergency Block Grant action (Action 1.26) came in lower than planned. To take advantage of these one-time dollars with a spending deadline, we moved the costs of three intervention teachers into this area, to extend the reach of other dollars and our intervention program. Other than these noted changes, no major implementation challenges or substantive deviations occurred, although the cost of some actions differed, which is explained in the prompt below.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

While most expenditures occurred as planned, there were some differences that are worth noting. Most of these differences are due to a 3% raise bargained across all employee groups, details follow for specific actions.

Action 1.1--Class Size Reduction Teachers, K-6

We saw a difference here based on individuals filling positions.

Action 1.2--Intervention Teachers

The difference in this action is due to the bargained raise, as indicated above.

Action 1.3--AVID teachers and associated costs

There was a slight difference here, bringing in this expenditure a bit higher. This is due to salary increases and the actual individuals filling the positions at our secondary sites.

Action 1.5--Newcomer Program

As we reviewed budgets this year, we made the decision to bring all newcomer teachers and secondary newcomer sections into the LCAP for clarity within our budgeting processes. This change accounts for the difference from our planned expenditures.

Action 1.8--Individual Site Grants

Our sites have been allowed to accrue carryover in their individual site grants. So the actual expenditures represent their allotment for projects in 24-25, as well as carryover from 23-24 which they were required to spend down. Additionally, in 25-26 we were able to add additional grant opportunities for intervention specific projects. This was a one-time opportunity, so the budgeted funds for 26-27 will be returned to our typical amount.

Action 1.11--TK IAs

Once the district began receiving ADA for TK aged students, we were able to move the cost of TK IAs into the general fund. As such, this action was not funded through the LCAP in 25-26.

Action 1.15--Refresh Budget for Student Devices

We have been intentionally carrying over funds for this action to ensure that we can request bulk discounts to buy large numbers of student Chromebooks each time they are needed. This year we spent approximately \$950,711 using this year's estimated expenditure and carryover from the prior year.

Action 1.19--Student Hotspots

We didn't need to purchase as many hotspots this year as we had budgeted for, so we saw a difference here.

Action 1.25--Planned Carryover for Additional Intervention Teachers

In this case, we are holding carryover for additional intervention teachers. We wanted to be transparent to explain to all educational partners why we were holding carryover and what we plan to do with it.

Action 1.26--Additional Instructional Assistants (LREBG Action)

As explained above, we were able to add three intervention teachers in this funding resource, due to lower cost individuals filling the IA positions. We will continue to spend out these dollars over the course of the next two years in this fashion.

Analysis Statement: As noted in the metric section above, Lucia Mar experienced growth in virtually every metric that is directly associated with student learning, including for students in our unduplicated subgroups. The identified actions have been a success based on direct and anecdotal evidence, and feedback provided by educational partners. Due to continued efforts in professional learning, intervention, and other related efforts, we anticipate continued growth across these measures. These actions have positively impacted these goal indicators. Efforts in these action areas correlate directly to an increase in student learning indicators, especially for English learners, foster youth, and/or low income students. Because these actions were effective, we will continue the majority into the 25-26 school year unless noted below.

Action: Action 1.12 - Career Technicians

Effectiveness of the Action: Effective

Metrics: CTE Pathway Completion Rate, A-G Completion and CTE Pathway Completion Rate

Analysis Statement: As noted in the metric section above, Lucia Mar experienced significant growth in CTE completion, including for students in our unduplicated subgroups. The identified action has been a success based on direct and anecdotal evidence, and feedback provided by educational partners. Due to continued efforts in supporting students, we anticipate continued growth across these measures. This action has positively impacted these goal indicators. Because this action was effective, we will continue it into the 25-26 school year.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Based on performance reviews and educational partner input, several refinements are planned:

Enhanced Monitoring: Add-ons to Aeries (Action 1.18) will support more precise subgroup data tracking.

Tutoring & Expanded Services: Additional tutoring hours (Action 1.20) and expanded support for LTELs (Action 1.6) will be emphasized.

Behavioral & SEL Support: Expanded social-emotional learning (Action 1.24) and mental health services were also highlighted for expansion in subsequent cycles.

Highlighted Professional Learning: We have captured the district's commitment to professional learning by noting a day entirely focused on that task (Action 1.28). In 26-27 teachers will focus on updated curriculum adoptions in English Language Arts (K-6) and secondary Mathematics. Additionally, we have captured the district's commitment to new teacher induction (Action 1.27) as well, highlighting our focus on ensuring our newest teachers receive support to close gaps for our most impacted learners.

Enhanced Student Support: Based on feedback from educational partners, we are planning to purchase an ASB card for every high school student at each school, which is captured in Action 1.8, Individual Site Grants. If this is successful after the next year, we will capture that action separately once we start the new three-year LCAP cycle next year.

Streamlined Funding: As discussed above, our TK IAs are now funded through the general fund. Action 1.11 is noted for continuity's sake, but is listed with no cost, as they are no longer funded with LCAP dollars.

We have updated metrics in our Math Local Benchmark. Due to a new K-5 math adoption, now only secondary students are completing the Math Fastbridge exam. As such we have changed the baseline to include only secondary students, and updated our year one outcomes accordingly. Additionally, we have added new metric 1.21 for i-Ready Mathematics, to show information for our K-5 students. Our baseline and year one metrics match, as this is our first year of implementation.

We have also updated our CAST Metric (1.20). Our benchmark reported the percentage of students who met or exceeded standards, as that was the only way the State provided information in 22-23. Now the State has added CAST to the CA School Dashboard, which means we

can report on Distance from Standard, which is a more accurate report, and matches our information in metrics 1.5 and 1.6 (CAASPP ELA and Math). We've included details about both versions of the metric, and will be able to provide "Difference from Baseline" information on Distance from Standard in next year's LCAP.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

Goal 2 was implemented comprehensively across all school sites. Key actions included adding counselors (Action 2.1), psychologists (2.2), nurses (2.3), and mental health supports such as Licensed Marriage and Family Therapists (2.10) and student advocates (2.6) These actions continued to be widely supported across all school sites and among all educational partners. The district expanded its Positive Behavioral

Interventions and Supports (PBIS) and safety training through a student safety coordinator (2.4) and campus supervisors (2.12). Additionally, interpreters (2.8) and parent liaisons (2.9) helped enhance communication and engagement with families, especially for EL and foster youth.

No major deviations from the planned actions were reported. The only exception this is the addition of a one-time project (Action 2.17) to place mounted iPads in each secondary classroom and many office spaces to track student attendance and participation in a variety of ways. This addition came from savings from formerly budgeted TK IAs (former Action 1.11), which were moved out of this funding source for 25-26.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

While most actions were implemented as budgeted, two actions incurred lower-than-expected service costs due to demand. Some differences are due to the district bargaining a 3% raise for all employee groups. Details are indicated below.

Action 2.1--Additional Counseling

The lower cost here was due to individuals filling specific positions, but all positions were filled as planned.

Action 2.2--Additional School Psychologists

The lower cost here was due to individuals filling specific positions, but all positions were filled as planned.

Action 2.5--General Education Behavior Specialists

Positions were filled as planned, with the individuals in those positions sitting at a higher rate on the salary schedule in comparison with our planned expenditures.

Action 2.8--District Interpreters

The difference here is due to the raise bargained in for our classified employees.

Action 2.9--Parent Liaison

We added an additional part-time position at one of our highest need sites.

Action 2.10--LMFT

This position was not filled for a portion of the year, accounting for the lower than planned cost.

Action 2.14--Elementary Music

Individuals in these positions came in at a lower rate than previous years.

Due to continued efforts in all areas of student health and wellbeing, including positive behavior supports and interventions (PBIS), proactive teaching, clear and communicated behavioral expectations, and other projects, we anticipate continued growth across the measures. These actions have positively impacted these goal indicators. Efforts in these action areas correlate directly to an increase in health and wellbeing indicators, especially for English learners, foster youth, and/or low income students. Because these actions were effective, we will continue them into the 26-27 school year.

The identified actions have been a success based on direct and anecdotal evidence, and feedback provided by educational partners. Due to continued efforts from key staff including our district nurses, translators, and parent liaisons, we anticipate continued improvements across the measures. These actions have positively impacted these goal indicators. Efforts in these action areas correlate directly to an increase in health and wellbeing indicators, especially for English learners, foster youth, and/or low income students. Because these actions were effective, we will continue them into the 26-27 school year.

Several actions had strong correlations to progress on key metrics:

Attendance (Metric 2.1) and Chronic Absenteeism (2.2) improved for all subgroups, with notable gains among EL and socioeconomically disadvantaged students—supported by interventions from counselors, LMFTs (2.10), and interpreters (2.8).

Dropout, Suspension, and Expulsion Rates (2.4–2.6) decreased for foster youth and SWD due to expanded behavioral and social-emotional supports.

School Climate (Metrics 2.7 and 2.8) saw increased student perception of connectedness and safety, with CHKS results improving significantly at both middle and high school levels.

Parental Involvement (2.9) increased through targeted engagement efforts, evidenced by growth in CHKS participation and favorable perception scores.

Overall, actions designed to target unduplicated pupils—particularly EL and foster youth—demonstrated effectiveness when paired with site-level behavioral health services and increased communication supports.

Based on metric trends and partner feedback:

Student advocate staffing (2.6) is being evaluated for possible redesign.

Interpreter roles (2.8) will be redefined to offer more proactive outreach during key transition periods.

LMFT services (2.10) will include structured progress monitoring to better track outcomes for participating students.

As noted, action 2.17 (iPads/Mounts) was a one-time project, and doesn't need to be funded in 26-27. We'll continue to use them in the upcoming school year.

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

In the 25-26 school year, Lopez High School qualified for both CSI and equity multiplier funding, which resulted in a rather extraordinary cash flow for a small school. With that said, the school was able to implement actions as planned.

No significant material differences were noted.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

We are very pleased that attendance rate has increased with extensive effort by the school site. Equally exciting, the suspension rate has improved within this school year. We continue to be challenged with CAASPP ELA and Mathematics. The school has been working intentionally to engage their teachers in deep professional learning community work to improve in those areas. The site qualifies for equity multiplier again for the 26-27 SY, so the newly specific and targeted actions explained should help to see improvements in all metrics.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

While the metrics have remained the same for the coming school year, the school team has worked to be more specific and targeted with actions for 26-27, which are articulated below. The principal and his team have worked with educational partners to design a plan that will continue to target needed improvements. That includes continuing to provide additional counseling support for students (Action 3.1) and two instructional assistants (Action 3.2). The school has also decided to add additional hours to their campus supervisor to support attendance efforts, including truancy prevention and positive behavior intervention and support (Action 3.3).

 - This amount is the Total Planned Percentage of Improved Services (5) subtracted from the Total Estimated Actual Percentage of Improved Services (8).

LCFF Carryover Table

- **10. Total Percentage to Increase or Improve Services for the Current School Year (6 divided by 9 plus Carryover %)**
 - This percentage is the Estimated Actual LCFF Supplemental and/or Concentration Grants (6) divided by the Estimated Actual LCFF Base Grant (9) plus the LCFF Carryover – Percentage from the prior year.
- **11. Estimated Actual Percentage of Increased or Improved Services (7 divided by 9, plus 8)**
